The Registration Process

- January 16 Curriculum Night
- January 15, 21, 24 6th grade students visit Irving for a tour and learn about classes
- January Students will select courses on a course selection sheet and return it to their elementary school. Elementary teachers and counselors will review and provide academic advising.
- February 3–7 Students will register for their classes through SIS StudentVue
- Late February Irving will send a message for families to review the choices in SIS

The Registration Process

- February/March/April Elementary teachers and Irving staff review course requests. If there is a concern that a class might be too difficult or too easy, a staff member will reach out to parents/guardians.
- Mid-March Mock schedules will be shared. These show the classes registered for, but not the actual schedule.
- March 31 Last day for schedule change requests
- Summer Review by Irving for support class placement

Create a SIS ParentVue Account

If you don't already have a SIS ParentVue account set up, please reach out to your elementary school to do this. You will be able to see the courses your child has registered to take along with their attendance, grades once they get to Irving, standardized test scores and several other items about your child.

Selecting Classes

- *Students will plan their course requests and mark them on the course selection sheet. They return this to their elementary school.
- *6th grade students will enter these classes in SIS.
- *Parents can see the classes in SIS. They can contact Irving if a change needs to be made.

Classes at Irving

- *All students must take English, social studies, math, science and health/physical education.
- *Students can choose elective classes to fill 2 periods (2 year-long, 1 year-long and 2 semester or 4 semester classes). Students will also choose 4 alternate classes.
- ★We do our best to give the top choices, however alternate classes may be substituted.

What is an honors class?

- *Classes in the four core content areas of mathematics, English, social studies and science at every middle school
- *An extended FCPS Program of Studies designed for high-ability and high-achieving learners
- *Provides for ascending levels of intellectual demand and helps prepare for advanced classes in high school

What else is an honors class?

- *Uses advanced reading, writing and research materials
- *Accelerates the pace of teaching and learning which allows students to explore deeper understanding and apply new knowledge
- *Assigns work that requires greater levels of independence

English, History & Science: On level vs. Honors

Your child should consider On Level Courses if he/she:

- Resists leisure/choice reading
- Doesn't enjoy writing, writes to fulfill requirements
- Requires prompting to complete work
- Reading on or below grade level

Your child should consider Honors if he/she:

- Enjoys reading/writing and does so on a regular basis
- Is comfortable expressing and explaining ideas in writing
- Has an interest in seeking more information in that subject
- Reads higher level texts
- Enjoys being challenged

The Virginia Literacy Act

Based on the current Virginia Literacy Act K-3, which is set to expand to grades 4-8 in the 2025-26 school year, students who demonstrate below-grade level reading will be provided:

- an evidenced-based literacy intervention approved by the state
- a Reading Plan in SIS to monitor their progress

Currently, our criteria are students who score below benchmark on both the Reading SOL AND iReady Reading Assessment. VDOE has not yet shared the criteria for the 2025-26 school year.

US History II On Level

- Materials, notes, and assignments are more scaffolded/supported accommodations like read aloud, definitions, and sentence starters might be provided to all students.
- Assessments focus more on knowledge, understanding and application. Students work with fewer primary sources.
- Performance Assessments include more whole class instruction/group work and we spend more time on the writing process.
- Students read shorter/simplified passages, are expected to write less and fulfill fewer requirements.


US History II Honors

- Materials, notes, and assignments expect students to write full sentences and analyze ideas.
- Assessments focus more on analyzing and evaluating primary source information.
- Performance Assessments have less guidance and more independent work time.
- Students read longer passages and primary sources, write more and are expected to fulfill more requirements.
- Honors materials are created with the expectation that students can read and write at or above grade level.

Examples of Primary Sources used in US History Classes

Prompt - Should Andrew Carnegie be remembered in history as a hero or villain?

On level writes a 3 paragraph essay with 3 pieces of evidence while the HN classes write 4 paragraphs with 6 pieces of evidence to support their thesis.

Andrew Carnesie had a passion for peace and spent the later years of his life making the world a better place. He deeply valued education and built around 1,700 libraries alone with funding the Tuskeger Institute, Carnesie Mellon University, and the Carnesie Corporation which supported schools and colleges around the United States. Carregie also donated around \$10 million to funding teachers in small-town schools. Andrew Cameric longed for world peace and helped fund the Anti-Imperialist League. As part of the league, he attempted to pay \$20 million in hope that the U.S. would not take over the Philippines. In 1910, Carnegie founded the Carnesie Endowment for International Peace which is a think tank that helps to provide non-rortisan views on issues and momotes world reacc around the globe.






- 8th Grade Standards

- KEY Pre-Algebra Topics Covered: multi-step equations, combining like terms AND distributing, slope AND y-intercept










- Probability: Theoretical vs Experimental

Math 7 Honors





- Probability: Compound probability (like rolling a die and landing on a 6 twice)
- Geometry: Focus on Pythagorean Theorem and solving for angle measures using multi setp equations
- Statistics: Scatter Plots and Box & Whisker Plots

Is your child ready for Math 7 HN?

Skills:

- are comfortable with 6th grade standards before going to 8th grade standards
- order fractions, decimals, percents, positive, and negative numbers
- add, subtract, multiply, and divide fractions and integers
- graph linear equations (i.e. y=-2/3x)
- solve two-step equations

Scores:

- 475 or higher on previous math SOLs
- mostly 4's in previous math courses

Work Habits:

- excellent attendance
- completes assignments

Math Supports Offered at Irving Middle School

- Math Support Center: After school support from two Math teachers on Mondays, Tuesdays, and Thursdays. Located in the Library
- Just In Time Support: Tuesdays and Thursdays, students can make a pass to seek support from their math teacher during advisory.
- 3. Reassessments: All summative assessments can be retaken.
- 4. Advisory Intervention Cycles: Each quarter, teachers select students to join their advisory class and receive extra support on Tuesdays and Thursdays
- 5. **Mathspace Textbook:** All students have access to an online textbook with videos, practice problems, instant feedback, and hints.


Considerations when deciding about the core classes

Core options for rising 7th grade students.




Information about Algebra I Honors will be sent following the SOL's in the spring and schedules will be adjusted for students who qualify (for now, these students can select Math 7 Honors).

Intervention Classes

- Irving offers intervention classes in the areas of reading, math, and executive function skills for students that need additional support.
- Intervention classes take the place of one elective and may be semester or year long depending on student need.
- Irving will review student data and reach out to families if we think your student could benefit from one of these classes. You can also reach out to Irving counselors if you think your child would benefit from an intervention class.
